Highly regarded by their peers, the individuals chosen for this seventh class of Innovators are active in educating industry members as well as future design stars, volunteer for worthy causes within the design community and beyond, push the limits of design and lead through their entrepreneurship.

At a time when the design industry is in flux due to labor shortages, excessive lead times for materials and skyrocketing costs, industry professionals are responsible for keeping everything humming and maintaining consumer confidence. 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#### **Lauren Schulte**

Advocating for the design industry and her local area leads to changes for designer

Lauren Schulte has a Bachelor's degree in both Fine Arts and Psychology, which helps her blend her artistic viewpoint with her understanding of the psychological aspects in every remodeling project.

Schulte started her design career as a kitchen designer at The Home Depot in Buffalo, NY and moved on to working for one of the largest kitchen design firms in western New York. 
